Please join us **Thursday March 17** (7-10pm) as we launch this exciting show featuring the work of photobloggers Sam Javanrouh, Matt O'Sullivan, Rannie Turingan, Davin Risk, Gayla Trail, Jonathan Day-Reiner, and Adam Krawesky. Their images have graced the pages of *Spacing*, or your computer screen, but now you have the chance to examine their beautiful photographs up close. The show runs from March 16 to April 23, 2005.

ABOUT SPACING

Spacing is one of the most talked about new magazines on Canadian newsstands. The publication examines the varied and complex issues that challenge Toronto's urban landscape and public spaces. Spacing has hit a nerve with Toronto residents (and other urban enthusiasts) who also want to make this city a remarkable place to live, but are not afraid to voice their concerns. The magazine has showcased some of the top young writers and visual artists the city has to offer (Sheila Heti, Jim Munroe, Darren O'Donnell, Ryan Bigge, Misha Glouberman, Ed Keenan, and the above mentioned photobloggers). With only three issue under its belt, Spacing has begun to bring home some hardware: an award for "Best Single Issue Design" (June 2004) from Applied Arts magazine, and a nomination as "Best New Title" in Utne magazine's Independent Press Awards (The Walrus ended up winning). The editors of Spacing are also the creators of the Toronto subway station button series, a collection of 1-inch buttons that replicate the visual landmarks found on the walls of each stop. The National Post called the promotion the "civic-pride fashion statement of the year."

ABOUT PHOTOBLOGS

Photobloggers are a new breed of multimedia artists, combining their internet and photography skills to publish daily visual slices of life through their websites. Unlike a portfolio website or an online gallery, which become static and dated, a photoblog is dynamic as it is published frequently with new images for visual consumption and judgement. In Toronto alone, there are over 70 documented photoblog sites listed on toronto.photobloggers.org (a hub for blog activity in Toronto), and thousands more around the world listed on www.photoblogs.org (a worldwide directory of photoblogs and resources).

Over the last five years we have seen the rise of the digital camera market that has enabled people to capture their surroundings at a phenomenal rate. It has also empowered a new generation of photographers to flourish because of lower costs, instant results and a quick learning curve that only digital photography can provide.

Toronto's photobloggers are some of the most popular in the world. Each day, over 20,000 people visit the websites of the photobloggers taking part in PUBLICity. Sam Javanrouh's website is the second most popular photoblog in the world, while Jonathan Day-Reiner at no. 10, and Matt O'Sullivan at no. 15 are catching up. The other four photobloggers are all in the top 30.

The son of an acclaimed Iranian cinematographer, Sam immigrated from Tehran to Toronto in 1999. He found work as a graphic designer and quickly moved to a senior position at a local post-production house. Finding time between deadlines, Sam created his photoblog — "Daily Dose of Imagery" which quickly gained notoriety in cyberspace, as well as being featured in The Toronto Star, Spacing, CBC Radio 3, BBC and a variety of other publications and was recently selected as Toronto's number one Blog in 2004 by Now magazine.
